THE KEEPER, by Jennifer Egan. (Knopf, \$23.95.) Old grievances drive the plot of this novel, set in a castle and a prison. Egan deftly weaves threads of sordid realism and John Fowles-like magic.

TALK TALK, by T. Coraghessan Boyle. (Viking, \$25.95.) The heroine of Boyle's latest novel goes in cross-country pursuit of an identity thief.

FRANCIS CRICK: Discoverer of the Genetic Code, by Matt Ridley. (Atlas/HarperCollins, \$19.95.) The life and work of the man who, along with James Watson, identified DNA's structure.

GUANTÁNAMO AND THE ABUSE OF PRESIDENTIAL POWER, by Joseph Margulies. (Simon & Schuster, \$25.) A civil rights lawyer indicts the Bush administration's detention policies.

THE LIBRETTIST OF VENICE: The Remarkable Life of Lorenzo Da Ponte, Mozart's Poet, Casanova's Friend, and Italian Opera's Impresario in America, by Rodney Bolt. (Bloomsbury, \$29.95.) Da Ponte wrote the texts for "Le Nozze di Figaro," "Don Giovanni" and "Così Fan Tutte."

MAMMALS, by Pierre Mérot. Translated by Frank Wynne. (Black Cat/Grove/Atlantic, paper, \$13.) An improbably charismatic ne'er-do-well is the narrator of Mérot's darkly comic novel.

GRIEF, by Andrew Holleran. (Hyperion, \$19.95.) Holleran's middle-aged gay hero mourns his mother, his empty life and a generation's agony.

Paperback Row

1776, by David McCullough. (Simon & Schuster, \$18.) McCullough, the Pulitzer Prize-winning author of "John Adams," evokes the turbulence of 18th-century colonial life in this intimate account of the American Revolution and the year of setbacks for the rebels that finally ended with George Washington's stunning victory at Trenton. McCullough skillfully captures both sides of the conflict, from the flinty Continental Army to the daunting British warships, "the largest, most powerful force ever sent forth from Britain or any nation." In the Book Review, Tony Horwitz called "1776" a "stirring and timely work."

HIDE & SEEK, by Clare Sambrook. (Canongate, \$13.) Narrated by 9-year-old Harry Pickles, Sambrook's taut first novel concerns the aftermath of the disappearance of Harry's younger brother, Dan, and the breakdown of a happy, middle-class London childhood.

MISS LEAVITT'S STARS: The Untold Story of the Woman Who Discovered How to Measure the Universe, by George Johnson. (Atlas/Norton, \$13.95.) This is an illuminating profile of Henrietta Leavitt (1868-1921), the Harvard College Observatory assistant who discovered a direct correlation between the variable and actual brightness of certain stars, enabling astronomers to use those stars as cosmic yardsticks. Our reviewer, Simon Singh, said Johnson, a science reporter for The New York Times, "provides a remarkable insight into the role of women in science a century ago." **LAVOISIER IN THE YEAR ONE: The Birth of a New Science in an Age of Revolution**. (Atlas/Norton, \$13.95.) Madison Smartt Bell's biography of the

18th-century French chemist and social reformer Antoine Laurent Lavoisier is a two-part story. It describes Lavoisier's efforts to explain how chemical processes work, and his pursuit by French revolutionaries.

NIGHT DRAWS NEAR: Iraq's People in the Shadow of America's War, by Anthony Shadid. (Picador, \$15.) An American of Lebanese descent, Shadid has reported for The Washington Post from Iraq since the war began and won the 2004 Pulitzer Prize for international reporting. In "Night Draws Near" he offers a harrowing portrait of life in post-war Iraq and the fallout endured by ordinary Iraqis. Shadid also provides a damning account of the Bush administration's failure to prepare adequately for the postwar occupation. "It is Anthony Shadid's rare achievement to have recorded and restored the voices of those most directly affected by the war in Iraq," Ben Macintyre wrote here.

BANGKOK TATTOO, by John Burdett. (Vintage, \$12.95.) This richly imagined sequel to Burdett's 2003 thriller, "Bangkok 8," plunges readers back into the culture of Bangkok's red-light district. When the star attraction at his mother's brothel is suspected of killing a C.I.A. officer, Detective Sonchai Jitpleecheep distracts the Americans with a cover-up involving Muslim separatists in southern Thailand while he solves the murder.

THE LADY AND THE PANDA: The True Adventures of the First American Explorer to Bring Back China's Most Exotic Animal, by Vicki Constantine Croke. (Random House, \$14.95.) Croke retells the story of the socialite Ruth Harkness, who

in 1936 took up her late husband's quest and successfully captured an infant panda, Su-Lin.

IT'S ALL RIGHT NOW, by Charles Chadwick. (Harper Perennial, \$15.95.) This touching novel, by a retired British civil servant and first-time author, is the story of a nobody. When we first meet Chadwick's diarist narrator in the early 1970's, Tom Ripple is on the far side of middle age, with a "small house" in London, a "small job" and "two perfectly satisfactory children." From young parenthood to early retirement, Chadwick conveys Tom's slightest observations, petty miseries and daily regrets. In the Book Review Allison Pearson praised the novel's "sly humor and pitiless honesty."

THE FACE OF A NAKED LADY: An Omaha Family Mystery, by Michael Rips. (Mariner/Houghton Mifflin, \$12.95.) In his oddly surreal memoir of growing up in Nebraska, Rips recounts his quest to understand his late father's secret life — which included a hidden portfolio of nude paintings of a woman Rips had never met.

4TH OF JULY, ASBURY PARK: A History of the Promised Land, by Daniel Wolff. (Bloomsbury, \$14.95.) This is a wonderfully evocative history of the New Jersey resort town where Bruce Springsteen made a name for himself in the 1970's. Wolff footnotes some of the geographical features in Springsteen's lyrics and shows how Asbury Park's music scene influenced his early sound.
